c) Members suggested providing assignments on Cyber Security and Personal data security law to gain Knowledge on these aspects.

d) Panel Members suggested incorporating other concepts apart from Agricultural

Marketing in Rural marketing course.

e) Members advised to relook in to course objectives of the courses and suggested to provide reference books to all the subjects.

Logistics & Supply chain Management

a) Panel members suggest including the concept of IT in SCM and including book titled Supply Chain Management- Text and Cases Janat Shah, Pearson.

b) Panel members emphasized on the change in the course names as:

'Storage and Warehouse Management' to 'Warehouse Management'

'Supply Chain and Risk Modeling Management' to 'Supply Chain Management and Risk Modeling'

'Distribution Management for Global Supply Chain' to 'Global Supply Chain Management'

'Exim Procedure and Documentation' to 'Export and Import Management'.

c) Panel members suggested including concept of 'Lean Management' in Inventory Management.

d) Members also suggest including 'process of storage of Goods' concepts in Warehouse Management course.

Finance Specialization

- a) The Investment Management course should include Investment process, sources of investment and economic investment in the Module 1. The content of technical analysis and fundamental analysis is sufficient for the discussion in module 3
- b) D-MAT Account should be added in module 1 of Financial markets and Services. The content of EXIM bank should be removed
- c) The Tax management course should be renamed as Direct taxation and Indirect taxation
- d) IT returns component should be added to get the practical component in direct taxation

e) Financial engineering content should be added to Financial Modelling Course

f) The course Banking and Insurance to be changed to Insurance and Risk Management and syllabus content should be revised accordingly

g) In wealth Management course derivatives management content should be added

- h) The book The Scam by DebashisBasu and SuchetaDalal should be added as reference book in Behavioural Finance Course
- Management Accounting Exposure content can be added in IFM Course



Human Resource specialization

- a) Panel members suggested to include 'Resume, C.V' in the place of Bio Data and also advice to incorporate the concepts of Remote work, hybrid work and work from office in Talent Acquisition course.
- b) Members suggested to rename the courses as:
 - 'HR Analytics' to 'Human Resource Analytics'
 - 'HR Audit' to 'Human Resource Audit'
 - 'Industrial Relations & Labour Laws' to 'Employee Relations & Labour Laws'
 - 'Employee Talent Management' to 'Talent Management'
- c) Panel members suggested including concepts 'Immersive Training or 360 Degree Training in Learning & Development course.
- d) Panel members suggested adding concepts on 'Indian Leaders, role of leader in crisis management' in Leadership subject.
- e) Members suggested changing 3rdModule title according to the contents in it and including the concept of 'Self-management' in Personal Growth & Interpersonal Effectiveness course.
- f) 'Role of PRO' needs to be included instead of PR role in Public Relations course.
- g) Panel members suggested adding other components of satisfaction along with salary factor and comparison-ratio in Compensation & Reward system subject.

Plan day college program (For more details refer to Chapter 6, AICTE Activity Point Program, Model Internship Guidelines): Over and above the academic grades, every regular student admitted to the 4 years Degree program and every student entering 4 years Degree programs through lateral entry, shall earn 100 and 75 Activity Points respectively for the award of degree through AICTE Activity Point Program. Students transferred from other Universities to the fifth semester are required to earn 50 Activity Points from the year of entry to VTU. The Activity Points earned shall be reflected on the student's eighth semester Grade Card. The activities can be spread over the years, any time during the semester weekends, and holidays, as per the liking and convenience of the student from the year of entry to the program. However, the minimum hours' requirement should be fulfilled. Activity Points (non-credit) do not affect SGPA/CGPA and shall not be considered for vertical progression. In case students fail to earn the prescribed activity Points, an Eighth Semester Grade Card shall be issued only after earning the required activity points. Students

shall be admitted for the award of the degree only after the release of the Eighth semester Grade Card.
